# **Careers in Victim Studies Panels**

The Crime Victims' Institute (CVI) collaborates with the Department of Victim Studies at Sam Houston State University to host Careers in Victim Studies Panels. The Department of Victim Studies offers education in victim studies and services at the undergraduate and graduate level. These panels are designed to introduce victim studies students to different careers and opportunities that are available in the field. Panelists are asked questions from students in the Department of Victim Studies, so the information presented is tailored to the students' needs. Presenters provide information about their work experience and agency information that they feel would be beneficial for career-searching students. These panels are held biannually, in the fall and spring semesters, over zoom to accommodate and be accessible for more students. For the first Careers in Victim Studies Panel in the fall of 2020, we welcomed panelists with experience in law enforcement, adult and children's protective services, victim advocacy research, and district attorney's offices. In the spring of 2021, the panel was led by practitioners with experience in probate courts, forensic nursing, human trafficking victim services, and child welfare education projects. During this fall semester, panelists had experience in forensic interviewing, legal aid, human trafficking victim services, and adult and children's protective services. As shown by a post-panel survey, students are appreciative of the opportunity to be introduced to a variety of careers in the victim services field.

We are grateful to all of our panelists for being willing to speak with our students and are excited to plan our next Careers in Victim Studies Panel for this spring!

# **Success of Webinars**


The CVI and the Department of Victim Studies at Sam Houston State University are proud to host free webinars to provide information about different types of victimization and ways to approach working

# **Crime Victims' Institute Dashboard**



Every year, the CVI team produces the Dashboard. This resource provides a broad collection of key indicators of victimization in Texas during the past year. The report includes reported victimization incidents, the scope of service utilizations, from various government and nongovernment resource providers, offender accountability, and results from victimization surveys. Specifically, the Dashboard collects data from the Texas Department of Family and Protective Services, the Texas Council on Family Violence, the Texas Department of Public Safety, and the Texas Judicial Branch. The presentation of these statistics allows for monitoring of trends, strengthens intervention policies and practices, and informs implementation of prevention tactics. Additionally, the Dashboard assists with amending existing programs and policies, allowing for the adoption of practices that are better suited to reduce and ultimately end victimization and assist survivors.
